

<u>September 24, 2023</u> – Tour of the Rio Grande. The Tour (<u>https://www.torgbc.com</u>) runs from the Bernalillo County / Int'l Sunport Rail Runner Station located at 113 Rio Bravo SE in Albuquerque and continues south through Los Lunas, Belen and loops around Bernardo, NM. The route runs parallel to the Rio Grande with beautiful views and sights of the more relaxed side of New Mexican life. The ride offers multiple distance points for riders of any caliber. <u>September 30, 2023</u> – Mt. Taylor 50K Run. This is a 50K endurance run on high-altitude trails in the Mt. Taylor/La Mosca area. See <u>http://www.mttaylor50k.com/</u>. The event organizers count on ham radio volunteers to supplement very limited cell service and provide medical/safety communications for the runners. Volunteers would be stationed at aid stations along the course to provide communications with the start/finish area. Volunteers are invited to a post-race barbeque and receive race "swag." October 22, 2023 – Duke City Marathon. Albuquerque area amateurs have supported this event for more than 20 years. A half marathon and 10K and 5K runs are included in the event, as well as several walks of varying distances.
